A SNAPSHOT OF THE OER PUBLISHING PROGRAM AS IT CONTINUES TO FLOURISH

First launched in early 2016 following the provision of three-year funding from the provincial government, the University's OER Publishing Program has grown significantly since then. The main objectives of the program are: to reduce textbooks costs for students; to contribute to greater access to higher education; and to support faculty members' creation of open-access textbooks and other types of OERs that integrate Canadian, local, and Indigenous content, and thereby better serve the learning needs of our students.

The OER Program (formerly called the Open Textbook Program) was initially focused on the creation and adaptation of open-access textbooks in large enrollment introductory-level undergraduate courses. The OER Program soon expanded to fund supplementary OERs for use in teaching at the University of Regina; such OERs include slide-decks, lab manuals, and field-trip research videos. OER-Program funded textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted not only by U of R faculty but also by instructors at other high education institutions in Canada and abroad. It is important to note that the OER Program requires that all textbooks funded by the program must go through a double-blind peer review in order to ensure that they meet the academic standards in the relevant area of studies.

More recently, the program has started to support "open-pedagogies", with the focus on funding the publication of senior undergraduate and graduate student papers written in a course. The faculty member teaching the course works with students to prepare their coursework for publication as a chapter or part of a chapter in an edited volume. The process of publishing is usually incorporated in the course from the start and serves as an important pedagogical strategy for enhancing student research and writing skills. This approach to open pedagogy fits well the U of R Strategic Plan's area of focus "Discovery" where teaching and research intersect in a mutually enhancing manner.

OER Program purchased an institutional licence to Pressbooks...

To facilitate faculty members' creation, adaptation, and use of OERs, the OER Program purchased an institutional licence to Pressbooks in collaboration with the Archer Library and the CCE. Pressbooks is one of the most-widely used open-access publishing platforms in the world. In addition to academic staff members, graduate students may also request a Pressbooks account with their supervisor's recommendation. The OER Program provides a variety of supports for U of R members with Pressbooks accounts who would like to use Pressbooks for publishing OERs or adapting suitable open-access publications for their courses.

Development of Indigenous-content textbooks has been an important priority for the OER Program. Several Indigenous-content textbooks have recently been published or are currently in development with the support of the OER Program. Among them are also Science textbooks such as Physics and Statistics.

The OER Program makes significant contributions to the University's recent initiative of zero-cost material courses (ZCM courses in short). These contributions include not only the development of open-access textbooks but also the provision of customized supports for faculty who wish to adopt open-access courseware for their courses. From Fall 2018 to Fall 2027, projected student savings from the open textbooks and supplementary OERs developed through the OER Program amount to no less than \$2.3 million.

The University of Regina is committed to supporting the creation and use of open educational resources for teaching and learning and expanding the repertoire of ZCM courses over the years to come.


STUDENTS AS PUBLISHED AUTHORS

When I broached the idea with students in my hybrid undergraduate-graduate course on Canadian Political History (HIST403/803) in the Fall 2020 semester of publishing their research essays, they were excited. What could be more exhilarating for a student than being a published author? My students were doing original research on how Canadian Prime Ministers have articulated their vision of Canada through Speeches from the Throne and in their Leaders' Day speeches. They are eager to share what they lean with others.

The idea of an ebook was a great one, especially during a year of remote teaching and learning.

I have published a number of books in the traditional paper format and even though most are available in electronic formats, I really had no idea of how all of that came together, but as students began work on their research



and writing, I reached out to Isaac Mulolani, an Instructional Designer with the U of R's Flexible Learning Centre. Mr. Mulolani was immediately supportive and he suggested we work through Pressbooks, an open source software platform that provides online authoring and publishing services. The platform is a key resource supported by the U of R's Open Educational Resource Program, an initiative that facilitates the creation and use of open educational resources for teaching and learning.

...the excitement of the students at having the published book was very gratifying and well worth the effort. With Mr. Mulolani's patient assistance, I learned the various stages of the process from setting up an account to uploading the finished essays and photos. I was surprised how easy and efficient the process was. It was all very intuitive and whenever I encountered a problem or had any concerns, Isaac was always available. He provided valuable support.

My name does not appear on the e-published version of the book. That was deliberate but I acted as editor of the project. I spent more time editing the various papers and proof-reading each chapter than might usually be the case with final essays. Students can be tasked with uploading their own work but it was suggested that it might be more efficient if I did so to insure consistency of font, format, and other minor technical issues.

I asked each student to supply two images for the publication but we had to be careful of copyright infringement. In the end, I found the images selected for most of the chapters, largely because I had access to several databases of photographs. This aspect tool more time than I had anticipated. If you embark on an e-book you should be aware that for most students the course ends when their final essays are submitted.


Are those projects worth the effort? Absolutely. I couldn't be happier with the end result. The book looks great. It took a lot of effort from the students and a little extra effort from me but the excitement of the students at having the published book was very gratifying and well worth the effort. One of the students, Rebecca Morris-Hurl agrees. 'I absolutely encourage other instructors and students to explore collective publishing because not only does it challenge students to produce quality work, but the process really does help foster a community in class – which is especially difficult in an online environment', she was quoted as saying in a URegina Research News post.

OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCE MERGE PROJECT

The Open Educational Resource merge project is a joint collaboration between the University of Regina OER program and Archer Library that began in fall of 2020. Initially created as a cloning project by OER coordinator Isaac Mulolani, the project began as a smaller venture to create a resource of academic resources already being utilized by Canadian universities. Similarly, library staff led by Cara Bradley had created three Research Guides or LibGuides to assist researchers, staff and faculty in their search for open textbooks and similar resources. Divided into three sections, the library resources are still available in the following format on the Research Guides section of the website: Open Textbooks, Open Educational Resources, and Open Access.



In conversation between the two units, Isaac approached staff at the library in efforts for collaboration. The root idea was to create a single one-stop-shop for any individual looking for further research resources in their discipline, to see what open textbooks were available for their current classes, to learn about the possibilities in creating online texts and cloning, and learn of the benefits of a program like PressBooks. Isaac created the initial clone from Concordia University, and along with User Services staff member Arlysse Quiring (Archer Library), the project began.

The merge has not been without challenges as resources were sorted, filtered, updated and cross referenced. What began as a collaborative idea became a significant merging of resources and teams. As the project continued to grow however, it became apparent that the purpose and end-goal of the document was exemplified by its creation. While the LibGuides and other OER will remain available to campus staff, students and faculty, this resource will be the starting point for anyone interested in OER.

The project, now entitled The University of Regina OER by Subject Directory was launched on May 6th. The open book will be considered a living document, with continual resource updates as they are discovered, created and contributed. OER PUBLISHING PROGRAM ORIGINS

As the cost of traditional (print) textbooks increases and access to journals and other educational materials becomes more difficult due to expensive licensing fees, universities and governments are looking for ways to reduce student expenses and improve access to education. Open textbooks, and other open educational resources, are viewed as one potential solution.

In 2015, the Government of Saskatchewan provided funding for the development of open textbooks and other open educational resources at post-secondary institutions in Saskatchewan, with the goal of reducing overall costs for students and enriching teaching and learning. Soon after the announcement of the government funding, the University of Regina created the Open Educational Resource Publishing Program (formerly called the Open Textbook Publishing Program).

The Program provides funding, and support to faculty who want to develop open textbooks or supplementary teaching resources for use in first- and second-year courses offered at the University of Regina.



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The OER Publishing Program was administered directly through the AVP-Academic's Office during July 2018 - May 2021. During this time, the Program was supported by an advisory committee and a Program Manager (Elsa Johnson until February 2020 and Isaac Mulolani since June 2020). The advisory committee was composed of:

As of May 2021, the OER Publishing Program was brought into the Center for Teaching and Learning. This merger is expected to create a great synergy between the two units.
